Introduction

"Same with me... I don't know what it is; I just need that bit to satisfy those desires... I have tried going out with friends but end up spending money without having actually gotten anything in return other than emptiness and anger. I've also gone to party but I have no fun if there's not girl I can spend the night with. I look everywhere to try and find that which can substitute the love and care of a partner but there seem to be nothing... this has gone on for quite a while now, and its getting more and more serious..."

"I have felt exactly the same for most of my life... it feels like I have way more bad luck, than good, and so its hard to motivate myself... I've always felt like I have greater purpose in life, but just can't figure it out. I guess until then I will continue to feel hollow..."

There is a void that man feels, an emptiness deep inside the soul. You may be able to relate to the above confession/story; if not totally, may be a line of it, at the least. The question is, are you sincere enough to admit there's a void? Everyone has their own level of emptiness felt; what is your story?

You were born with a void – a void you've been trying to fill all your life, whether you know it or not. You work, play, rest and also worship, tirelessly hoping that one or all of these would fill that void or emptiness, yet it seems all the same – vain!

You probably hoped or thought money would quench that emptiness you feel – since money answers to most of your needs. Then you hustled and got yourself some good cash; spent it well, yet you're back at one. So you get back to work, you even work harder and probably add another job, hoping to get more money, should in case the money you got earlier was just not enough to fill that void.

Where you missed it was thinking the void exists as a result of your needs – whatsoever, and this is not so. If you've ever felt joy even when quite a handful of your needs are not met yet, then you'd understand that your needs don't bring emptiness. In fact, some of your needs are mostly as a result of your emptiness. This piece has an exposition of the thoughts and life of the ancient King Solomon, who was considered the wisest man on earth – some still consider him as that.

Thoughts of King Solomon




The subject 'emptiness' might be considered as a syndrome that has eaten into the lifestyle of the middle class and lower class of every population but this is not totally true. The feeling of emptiness or 'void' cuts across different races, societal class, age, sex, even religious beliefs. There's no immunity for it. A classic example is that of the ancient and famous King of Israel who is well known for his incomparable wisdom and wealth – he also had his way with women – in fact, that in particular excites me, he was the don of women. 
Me: Wait a second! Seriously? Why would Solomon even ask that? His legacies and words are still relevant; so, of what does he speak?

Around and around and around it blows, blowing this way, then that - the whirling, erratic wind. All the rivers flow into the sea, but the sea never fills up. Me: Now that! Totally thoughtful and true. The seas never overflow; so are the needs and cravings of man – we are only contented, never totally satisfied wanting nothing more from life.

King Solomon: Everything's boring, utterly boring - no one can find any meaning in it. Boring to the eye, boring to the ear. What was will be again, what happened will happen again. There's nothing new on this earth. Year after year it's the same old thing. Does someone call out, "Hey, this is new"? Don't get excited - it's the same old story. Nobody remembers what happened yesterday. And the things that will happen tomorrow? Nobody will remember them either. Don't count on being remembered.

Me: But how can these things be? There's really nothing new? Probably why we have inventions rather than creations. I can't agree less that a stereotype is boring.

King Solomon: I looked most carefully into everything, searched out all that is done on this earth. And let me tell you, there's not much to write home about. God hasn't made it easy for us. I've seen it all and it's nothing but vapor and spitting into the wind. Life's a corkscrew that can't be straightened, A minus that won't add up. I said to myself, "I know more and I'm wiser than anyone before me in Jerusalem. I've stockpiled wisdom and knowledge." What I've finally concluded is that so-called wisdom and knowledge are mindless and witless - nothing but spitting into the wind. Much learning earns you much trouble. The more you know, the more you hurt.

Me: Its amazing how many would read this piece by King Solomon, probably hiss and say under their breath, “He only said that because he was rich, I’d rather be as rich and then say that too”. Its incredible how we chose not to learn from experienced people, just so that we can experience whatever there is to experience. I can imagine someone wanting to be just as rich as Solomon just to feel that void that Solomon felt – its just an imagination that could be true. We rather suffer on familiar grounds than escape through a path that is scarcely treaded. I have come to understand King Solomon’s point of view about life – its vain.

Good & Bad



I do not totally agree with this certain wise man on this subject – I'd be sharing my thoughts later in this book - even though I understand King Solomon's point of view. I believe there's something he didn't know that I know now, hence his thoughts and my perceptions.

King Solomon: A good reputation is better than a fat bank account. Your death date tells more than your birth date. You learn more at a funeral than at a feast - After all, that's where we'll end up. We might discover something from it.




God arranges for both good and bad days, So that we won't take anything for granted. - King Solomon

Don't be quick to fly off the handle. Anger boomerangs. You can spot a fool by the lumps on his head. Don't always be asking, "Where are the good old days?" Wise folks don't ask questions like that. Wisdom is better when it's paired with money, Especially if you get both while you're still living.

Me: Oh well! Now Solomon hits it hard. Could this be the missing link? Can the combination of wisdom and money save the world from the feeling of emptiness? The best seller book 'The Purpose-Driven Life' by Rick Warren exposed some truths about life and why we are all here on earth. He attributed the reason of our existence to a specific purpose of which we were all made – this purpose is person specific.




Wisdom is better when it's paired

King Solomon: Double protection: wisdom and wealth! Plus this bonus: Wisdom energizes its owner. Take a good look at God's work. Who could simplify and reduce Creation's curves and angles To a plain straight line? On a good day, enjoy yourself; On a bad day, examine your conscience. God arranges for both kinds of days So that we won't take anything for granted.

Me; This exposition is candid. King Solomon has acknowledges God as the being in charge of all the affairs of men. Taking an x-ray look into Solomon's perspective, you'd see that his relationship with God seems distant. He acknowledges God as a supreme being that is incomparable and undeniable. In fact, his picture of God is that being that rules in the affairs of men and determines what happens at the end of the day.

King Solomon: I've seen it all in my brief and pointless life - here a good person cut down in the middle of doing good, there a bad person living a long life of sheer evil. So don't knock yourself out being good, and don't go overboard being wise. Believe me, you won't get anything out of it.

Me: I giggled a bit when I first read that (in the Bible). It appears to have come out of a steaming and brutally dealt with mind. Since King Solomon had no record of war or grievance, I'll assume he thought that out of an overflow of memories of those around him – whether Israelite or not. Now if I may ask, which would you rather choose, a short life of being good or a long life of being bad? I hope you chose a good short life and figured what you'd get out of it: truthfully, there's a lot you can get out of being good, in this life or the next.

King Solomon: But don't press your luck by being bad, either. And don't be reckless. Why die needlessly? It's best to stay in touch with both sides of an issue. A person who fears God deals responsibly with all of reality, not just a piece of it. Wisdom puts more strength in one wise person than ten strong men give to a city. There's not one totally good person on earth, Not one who is truly pure and sinless.

Don't eavesdrop on the conversation of others. What if the gossip's about you and you'd rather not hear it? You've done that a few times, haven't you--said things Behind someone's back you wouldn't say to his face? I tested everything in my search for wisdom. I set out to be wise, but it was beyond me, far beyond me, and deep - oh so deep! Does anyone ever find it? I concentrated with all my might, studying and exploring and seeking wisdom - the meaning of life. I also wanted to identify evil and stupidity, foolishness and craziness.


Me: First, King Solomon talks about concentration: the first thing that popped up in my mind was yoga. Did King Solomon actual practice yoga too? He must have been a Mafia Lord! For all I care, there's certainly nothing new under the sun. Not long after I read that, I found out the wisdom that King Solomon spoke of here. "Have you ever come on anything quite like this extravagant generosity of God, this deep, deep wisdom? It's way over our heads. We'll never figure it out." (see Rom 11:33) , hence King Solomon may have been wrong - here's an answer to that school of thought: True wisdom is in God.

Don't fool yourself. Don't think that you can be wise merely by being up-to-date with the times. Be God's fool - that's the path to true wisdom. What the world calls smart, God calls stupid. It's written in Scripture, He exposes the chicanery of the chic. The Master sees through the smoke screens of the know-it-alls. - 1 Cor 3:18-20

King Solomon: But the wisdom I've looked for I haven't found. I didn't find one man or woman in a thousand worth my while.

Yet I did spot one ray of light in this murk: God made men and women true and upright; we're the ones who've made a mess of things.

Me: This resolution is the truth. God has made all things perfect – He made all things beautiful in its time yet we want to re-make things. God made wisdom, then we re-make wisdom – man can never attain God's promise without plying the path of God. Our efforts to reach a God-standard will always be futile as long we use our efforts to re-create the world and its systems.

The emptiness man feels is as a result of a disconnection from his source. This is usually a result of man trying to take charge and assume control of all things – you want to control your life, relationships and all, on your own. There is absolutely no problem with being in control but you cannot do it on your own without a feeling of emptiness. You were made by a maker who wants to be in synergy and synchrony with you. That was the original plan. And like King Solomon just pointed out, we want otherwise and so we mess it all up.

The Fear


Now King Solomon starts to streamline his thoughts. He had earlier compared good with evil/bad. He explores the possibility of living a well deserved life, a life devoid of the seeming emptiness of man. Here, he starts to present his surrender on the subjects of good and bad – interestingly, his new perspective was framed by the thoughts of God’s supremacy.

King Solomon: Watch your step when you enter God's house. Enter to learn. That's far better than mindlessly offering a sacrifice, Doing more harm than good.

Me: ‘Watch your step’ could possibly mean ‘understand your intentions’. This presents like King Solomon’s stand against religion. He points out that offering a sacrifice – performing a religious duty – in a somewhat mindless and stereotypical manner results in more harm than good. Religion kills – it does more harm than good. It is amazing how some people kill or destroy other people in the name of religion/God. Religion has brought war and tumult on earth. This is because most people perform an act of worship mindlessly – without deep thinking.

King Solomon: Don't shoot off your mouth, or speak before you think. Don't be too quick to tell God what you think he wants to hear. God's in charge, not you--the less you speak, the better.

Over-work makes for restless sleep. Over-talk shows you up as a fool. When you tell God you'll do something, do it--now. God takes no pleasure in foolish gabble. Vow it, then do it. Far better not to vow in the first place than to vow and not pay up. Don't let your mouth make a total sinner of you. When called to account, you won't get by with "Sorry, I didn't mean it." Why risk provoking God to angry retaliation? But against all illusion and fantasy and empty talk There's always this rock foundation: Fear God!



Religion kills – it does more harm than good.

Me: I believe King Solomon just pointed out the secret of his greatness – he fears God. He believed the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom (see Prov. 9:10). Don't mess things up for yourself. Fear God. God is the most supreme being in the universe (and whatever is bigger than the universe). The fear of God is only a show of common sense – well, that's where I think wisdom begins.

King Solomon: Don't be too upset when you see the poor kicked around, and justice and right violated all over the place. Exploitation filters down from one petty official to another. There's no end to it, and nothing can be done about it. But the good earth doesn't cheat anyone--even a bad king is honestly served by a field. The one who loves money is never satisfied with money, Nor the one who loves wealth with big profits. More smoke. The more loot you get, the more looters show up. And what fun is that - to be robbed in broad daylight?

Hard and honest work earns a good night's sleep, Whether supper is beans or steak. But a rich man's belly gives him insomnia. Here's a piece of bad luck I've seen happen: A man hoards far more wealth than is good for him and then loses it all in a bad business deal. He fathered a child but hasn't a cent left to give him.

He arrived naked from the womb of his mother; He'll leave in the same condition - with nothing. This is bad luck, for sure - naked he came, naked he went. So what was the point of working for a salary of smoke? All for a miserable life spent in the dark?


After looking at the way things are on this earth, here's what I've decided is the best way to live: Take care of yourself, have a good time, and make the most of whatever job you have for as long as God gives you life. And that's about it.

That's the human lot.

Yes, we should make the most of what God gives, both the bounty and the capacity to enjoy it, accepting what's given and delighting in the work. It's God's gift! God deals out joy in the present, the now. It's useless to brood over how long we might live.

Me: Here, King Solomon resolved that living a good life or being good in life is the real deal. He had seen the good and the bad people live and die and in his wisdom has thought it pertinent to live good. He also emphasizes using well whatever gift God has given you. If you seek relevance, your gift will make room for you; all in the context of the fear of God. The fear of God does not fill up the void you feel in your soul but it's certainly a good foundation for what would fill the void.

King Solomon: One time I saw wicked men given a solemn burial in holy ground. When the people returned to the city, they delivered flowery eulogies - and in the very place where wicked acts were done by those very men! More smoke. Indeed. Because the sentence against evil deeds is so long in coming, people in general think they can get by with murder.

Even though a person sins and gets by with it hundreds of times throughout a long life, I'm still convinced that the good life is reserved for the person who fears God, who lives reverently in his presence, and that the evil person will not experience a "good" life. No matter how many days he lives, they'll all be as flat and colourless as a shadow - because he doesn't fear God.

Solomon's Conclusion

Exploring the thoughts of King Solomon concerning life and the void we feel has been exciting. He had stated that all was vanity and compared it with vapour or smoke. Then he spelled out his thoughts about good and bad, stating we all should have a mix of both. He contradicted this point by advising that we should have the fear of God. He concluded that we should all do good, fearing God.

Here's what I understood: The good, the wise, and all that they do are in God's hands--but, day by day, whether it's love or hate they're dealing with, they don't know. Anything's possible. It's one fate for everybody - righteous and wicked, good people, bad people, the nice and the nasty, worshipers and non-worshipers, committed and uncommitted. I find this outrageous - the worst thing about living on this earth - that everyone's lumped together in one fate. Is it any wonder that so many people are obsessed with evil? Is it any wonder that people go crazy right and left? Life leads to death. That's it.

Still, anyone selected out for life has hope, for, as they say, "A living dog is better than a dead lion." The living at least know something, even if it's only that they're going to die. But the dead know nothing and get nothing. They're a minus that no one remembers. Their loves, their hates, yes, even their dreams, are long gone. There's not a trace of them left in the affairs of this earth. Seize life! Eat bread with gusto, Drink wine with a robust heart. Oh yes - God takes pleasure in your pleasure! Dress festively every morning. Don't skimp on colours and scarves. Relish life with the spouse you love each and every day of your precarious life (hey! That's if you've got a spouse!). 
Me: Selah


Part B

Mirrors don't deceive – no matter what kind of mirror it is. Still, you are not just what you see whenever you look into a mirror (whether the mirror is broken or not), there's a lot more to you than what meets the eye. In fact, the mirror reveals the least description of you.

First, you are a Spirit. Yes! You are a Spirit – the mirror would certainly not show you that. In the gospels of John, Jesus emphatically stated that God is Spirit... (see John 4:24). If God truly made man like Himself (see Gen 1:26), wouldn't you rather think that God first made a Spirit, since He is a Spirit? I believe before God made heaven and earth during the six-day creation, He already had you and I in Him. All He did was mould some clay – in His image – and then He breathe Adam's Spirit out, right into the moulded clay and that Spirit brought life to the clay.

Spirits carry life. That's why if a Spirit leaves a body, that body dies. A man's soul does not carry life, only the Spirit does. You are a Spirit and that Spirit contains a quenchable, timed material (life) that activates another earthly material, made of clay (body). The fusion of these two gives the Spirit (you) an exclusive ability to exist on the planet earth for a short period of time.




Solely the Soul

The soul comprises of the mind, will and emotions.






Your emotions can make you or ruin you. Unfortunately, it seems to have power to do you more harm than good. Whatever you feel (emotions) about a thing would determine what you think (mind) about it and hence the decisions (will) you make concerning that thing.



All three components of the soul – the mind, will and emotions – work together concurrently, hand-in-hand to ensure there is a wholesome being – you. I'd paint a better picture for you to see how powerful your soul is but I'd also show you why your Spirit is more important.

Knowledge is the food of the soul. The soul thrives on knowledge. The soul would be absolutely void and empty if the soul has no knowledge to thrive on. How do I know this? Well I know knowledge is like energy, it can neither be created nor destroyed but it can be transformed from one form to another.


The only source of information for their souls had been from God – they knew nothing other than God and Gods'.



In a bid to feel happy or whole, some people go out with friends – and the very desperate ones hang out even with their enemies. You must have heard of people who ‘drink away their sorrows’! What if I told you, you don’t have to feel depressed day of your life – ever again? That’s true! Its all in the soul – the information you feed your soul with. Fun will never make you whole.

Rest

Many people confuse the period of rest with the point or phase where you think about all you’ve done and then the feeling of fulfilment would come hovering over you like a cloud. No! Whether you rest well or you hardly take rest, it doesn’t fill that void.




Worship is a souls' obsession.


It's a necessary evil. The soul must worship something. The dilemma and question is, 'is your soul worshipping the true and the living God?'



The Creator


